JOHN 1:14

Definition of Logos: In Greek philosophy and in theology (the study of God), logos is the divine reason, or the immanent power of God, implicit in the cosmos, ordering it and giving it form and meaning.

The Trinity:

The Father, the Logos, and the Holy Spirit are not three beings, they are one being. Even though they are one being, they are not identical. All three are of the same essence, yet in some sense, they are distinguishable.

Genesis 1:2

Genesis 1:3-4 Then God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. ⁴ And God saw that the light was good. Then he separated the light from the darkness.

Genesis 2:7

Then the Lord God formed the man from the dust of the ground. He breathed the breath of life into the man's nostrils, and the man became a living person.

Fourth Strophe 1:14, 16-18 So the Logos became human and made his home among us. He was full of unfailing love and faithfulness. And we have seen his glory, the glory of the Father's one and only Son.

Colossians 1:15 Christ is the visible image of the invisible God. He existed before anything was created and is supreme over all creation, for through him God created everything in the heavenly realms and on earth.

Colossians 1:16

He made the things we can see and the things we can't seesuch as thrones, kingdoms, rulers, and authorities in the unseen world. Everything was created through him and for him.

Colossians 1:17 He existed before anything else, and he holds all creation together.

Colossians 1:18 Christ is also the head of the church, which is his body. He is the beginning, supreme over all who rise from the dead. So he is first in everything.

Colossians 1:19-20 For God in all his fullness was pleased to live in Christ, and through him God reconciled everything to himself. He made peace with everything in heaven and on earth by means of Christ's blood on the cross.

Principle #1 Jesus Christ is God and the scandal of His preexistence, descending, person, work, purpose, crucifixion, resurrection and re-ascension is something that every true believer must whole-heartedly believe.

Principle #2 We do not live in a nice world that God desires to make nicer. We live in a fallen and sin ravaged world. Sin is not a series of bad choices, but a state of being from which sinful choices continually flow.

Principle #3 The Gospel of Jesus Christ is not about being a message that offers hope. It is God's personal, intimate, and self-spoken message regarding our only hope.

Principle #4

When the Logos put on flesh and descended into our world, new possibilities were born. God's divine power was released into our broken world and into our broken lives, and now, we can be born again through grace by faith.

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
