God's Peace

The Lord's peace is present in relationships when equilibrium, tranquility, and richness are restored.

John 14:27 - ESV

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid.

John 14:27 - NLT

"I am leaving you with a gift peace of mind and heart. And the peace I give is a gift the world cannot give. So don't be troubled or afraid.

Two years later, when Absalom's sheep were being sheared at Baal-hazor near Ephraim, Absalom invited all the king's sons to come to a feast.

He went to the king and said, "My sheep-shearers are now at work. Would the king and his servants please come to celebrate the occasion with me?"

The king replied, "No, my son. If we all came, we would be too much of a burden on you." Absalom pressed him, but the king would not come, though he gave Absalom his blessing.

"Well, then," Absalom said, "if you can't come, how about sending my brother Amnon with us?"
"Why Amnon?" the king asked.

But Absalom kept on pressing the king until he finally agreed to let all his sons attend, including Amnon. So Absalom prepared a feast fit for a king.

Absalom told his men, "Wait until Amnon gets drunk; then at my signal, kill him! Don't be afraid. I'm the one who has given the command. Take courage and do it!"

So at Absalom's signal they murdered Amnon. Then the other sons of the king jumped on their mules and fled.

"Peace Keeping"

- We give in to manipulation.
- We agree to what is wrong.
- We ignore what is sinful.
- We keep quiet.
- We cave to pressure.
- We say we have "inner peace" to justify our actions.

Those who seek and work to usher God's peace into this world and into their relationships; love God, others, and themselves enough to disrupt false peace.

Clear, realistic, spoken, and agreed upon expectations are great tools to use in partnership with the Holy Spirit to usher God's peace into our lives.

The problem with most of our unmet expectations is that they tend to be subconscious, unrealistic, unspoken, and unagreed upon.

Unmet Expectations

- Subconscious we have expectations we are not even aware of until someone disappoints us.
- Unrealistic we have ill conceived expectations about others meeting our needs.

Unmet Expectations

- Unspoken we may have never clearly discussed with others what we need, expect, desire, or want.
- Unagreed Upon the other person never agreed to try and meet our expectations.

Even if we do all that we can to be ambassadors of God's peace, the fact is that some of our relationships will not experience God's peace.
