2 Samuel 12:1 So the Lord sent Nathan the prophet to tell David this story: "There were two men in a certain town. One was rich, and one was poor.

2 Samuel 12:2 The rich man owned a great many sheep and cattle.

2 Samuel 12:3a The poor man owned nothing but one little lamb he had bought. He raised that little lamb, and it grew up with his children.

2 Samuel 12:9 Why, then, have you despised the word of the Lord and done this horrible deed? For you have murdered Uriah the Hittite with the sword of the Ammonites and stolen his wife.

2 Samuel 12:10 From this time on, your family will live by the sword because you have despised me by taking Uriah's wife to be your own.

2 Samuel 12:11a "This is what the Lord says: Because of what you have done, I will cause your own household to rebel against you.

I will give your wives to another man before your very eyes, and he will go to bed with them in public view.

2 Samuel 12:12 You did it secretly, but I will make this happen to you openly in the sight of all Israel."

2 Samuel 12:13 Then David confessed to Nathan, "I have sinned against the Lord." Nathan replied, "Yes, but the Lord has forgiven you, and you won't die for this sin.

2 Samuel 12:14 Nevertheless, because you have shown utter contempt for the word of the Lord by doing this, your child will die."

2 Samuel 12:15 After Nathan returned to his home, the Lord sent a deadly illness to the child of David and Uriah's wife.

2 Samuel 12:16 David begged God to spare the child. He went without food and lay all night on the bare ground.

2 Samuel 12:18b "He wouldn't listen to reason while the child was ill," they said. "What drastic thing will he do when we tell him the child is dead?"

2 Samuel 12:19 When David saw them whispering, he realized what had happened. "Is the child dead?" he asked. "Yes," they replied, "he is dead."

2 Samuel 12:20a Then David got up from the ground, washed himself, put on lotions, and changed his clothes.

2 Samuel 12:20b He went to the Tabernacle and worshiped the Lord. After that, he returned to the palace and was served food and ate.

2 Samuel 12:21a His advisers were amazed. "We don't understand you," they told him. "While the child was still living, you wept and refused to eat.

2 Samuel 12:21b But now that the child is dead, you have stopped your mourning and are eating again."

2 Samuel 12:22 David replied, "I fasted and wept while the child was alive, for I said, 'Perhaps the Lord will be gracious to me and let the child live."

2 Samuel 12:23 But why should I fast when he is dead? Can I bring him back again? I will go to him one day, but he cannot return to me."

2 Samuel 12:24 Then David comforted Bathsheba, his wife, and slept with her. She became pregnant and gave birth to a son, and David named him Solomon.

2 Samuel 12:25 The Lord loved the child and sent word through Nathan the prophet that they should name him Jedidiah (which means "beloved of the Lord"), as the Lord had commanded.
